What does Home Visiting offer:

- Partnership with parents
- Identifying family needs
- Learning activities for the whole family
- Testing for child development and progress
- Connecting families to needed services and supports, including monthly activities with other program families

Benefits:

Parents are more likely to see an improvement in their parenting knowledge, leading to better outcomes for themselves and their children.

Children are more likely to be socially, emotionally, and physically healthy as they become school-ready.

Nurse Family Partnership

First-time expectant parents enrolling prior to 28 weeks pregnant to the child's 2nd birthday.

Nurses schedule home visits where they share information and set goals on child development, health, family well-being and interaction, and provide referrals as needed, as well as nutritional and fitness guidance. Visits typically last an hour.

Currently serving Clark and Nye counties.

Parents as Teachers

Expectant parents and families with children up to age 5 or kindergarten entry.

Home visitors provide information and materials to strengthen motor skills, cognitive skills, and social-emotional development. Home visitors screen the family for needs and provide referrals. Visits typically last 90 minutes.

Currently serving Washoe, Lyon, Carson City, Storey, and Mineral counties, as well as the Yerington Paiute Reservation.

Early Head Start

Expectant parents and families with children up to age 3.

This program combines the Parents as Teachers program curriculum with Head Start and has support staff for physical, nutritional, and mental health consultation. Visits typically last 60 - 90 minutes.

Currently serving Clark and Washoe counties.

Home Instruction for Parents of Preschool Youngsters

Families with children age 2 through kindergarten.

HIPPY is a peer-education program that uses role playing to allow parents to practice lessons to build reading skills and school readiness. Home visitors with specialized training provide books for parents to enhance their child's skills and development. Visits typically last 40 - 60 minutes.

Currently serving Clark, Washoe, and Nye counties.
